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I. CALL TO ORDER

Chair Velasquez called the meeting to order at 1:30 p.m.

II. PROCEDURAL ITEMS

A. Approval of Agenda and Additions to and Deletions from Agenda

There were no additions to or deletions to the agenda.

The agenda was unanimously APPROVED as distributed.

B. Approval of the May 11, 2018 Minutes for the Regular Formal Session of the Board of Control

Mr. Robert Cottrell addressed the Board of Control regarding sexual assault prevention posters that are distributed throughout campus to generate awareness. SVSU was recently awarded a \$25,044 grant from the State of Michigan Campus Sexual Assault Grant Program aimed at sexual assault prevention, and part of the program funding is intended to support the "Know Your Power" poster campaign designed by a nationally recognized organization.

2. Resolution to Approve the Addition of Grades Ninth through Twelfth to the New Standard Academy

RES-2279 It was moved and supported that the following resolution be adopted:

WHEREAS, the Saginaw Valley State University Board of Control has approved the charter school application for grades Pre-K-8 for The New Standard Academy; and

WHEREAS, The New Standard Academy must currently reject the application of secondary students (grades 9-12); and

WHEREAS, the current students being served by The New Standard Academy and their parents have requested the opportunity to provide a secondary education; and

WHEREAS, The New Standard Academy has a desire to provide an education service for secondary students;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Saginaw Valley State University Board of Control approve the application and program amendment providing for the addition of ninth through twelfth grade students beginning with the 2018-19 school year—adding one grade per year.

Dr. David Lewis commented that The New Standard Academy, located in Flint, Michigan, currently enrolls 511 students. He stated that the Academy currently occupies the former Flint Powers school.

Dr. Lewis noted that as a way of increasing their "footprint" in the greater Flint area, they are requesting to grow from a Pre-K-8 academy to a Pre-K-12 academy. He stated that their ultimate mission is to offer the full array of grade levels for families and community.

The motion was APPROVED unanimously.

3. Resolution to Approve the Addition of Pre-Kindergarten to Kingsbury Country Day School

RES-2280 It was moved and supported that the following resolution be adopted:

WHEREAS, the Saginaw Valley State University Board of Control has approved the charter school application for grades K-8 for Kingsbury Country Day School; and

WHEREAS, Kingsbury Country Day School must currently reject the application of pre-kindergarten students; and

WHEREAS, the current students being served by Kingsbury Country Day School and their parents have requested the opportunity to provide pre-kindergarten education; and

WHEREAS, Kingsbury Country Day School has a desire to provide an education service for pre-kindergarten students;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Saginaw Valley State University Board of Control approve the application and program amendment providing for the addition of pre-kindergarten students beginning with the 2018-19 school year.

Dr. Lewis commented that Kingsbury Academy is located in Oxford, Michigan and currently enrolls 257 students. He noted that the academy is requesting to move from a K-8 academy to a Pre-K-8 academy.

The motion was APPROVED unanimously.

4. Resolution to Approve Tenure Recommendation for Catherine Macomber

RES-2281 It was moved and supported that the following resolution be adopted:

WHEREAS, Faculty tenure provides continuous employment of a faculty member for at least a basic two-semester appointment during each fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, Tenure status is achieved when a faculty member is recommended by the Professional Practices Committee and by the Administration for continuous appointment henceforth;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, THAT the following faculty members be granted tenure, as provided by the terms of the SVSU – Faculty Association agreement, effective July 1, 2018:

Provost Huntley commented that the Professional Practices Committee (PPC) is recommending one individual for tenure. She noted that candidates who are recommended for both tenure and promotion are reviewed by faculty evaluation teams as well as the deans in each of their respective departments. She added, the portfolios are reviewed by members of the PPC where their performance, in terms of teaching, scholarly activities and service are evaluated. Provost Huntley concluded that all the candidates who are being recommended for both tenure and promotion have received strong support from the PPC.

Trustee Carmona asked how long someone serves as an assistant professor before they are promoted to associate professor and then associate professor to full professor. Provost Huntley replied typically 5 years at each rank.

The motion was APPROVED unanimously.

5. Resolution to Approve Promotion Recommendations

The motion was APPROVED unanimously.

6. Resolution to Grant Emeritus Status to Moe Bidgoli

RES-2283 It was moved and supported that the following resolution be adopted:

WHEREAS, Saginaw Valley State University grants emeritus/emerita status to retiring faculty/administrators who have served the University with distinction; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Moe Bidgoli gave thirty-three years of service to SVSU, having arrived at Saginaw Valley College in 1985, to join the faculty in the Department of Computer Science, and spending more than three decades until his retirement in December 2018 dedicated to serving the university in numerous capacities, including Chair of the Department of Computer Science, member of the Faculty Association Executive Board, faculty representative on the Curriculum and Academic Policies Committee, faculty representative for two terms on the Professional Practices Committee, and representative on the Academic Policy Review Committee; and

WHEREAS, in his career at SVSU, Mr. Bidgoli played an instrumental role in not only the development and institution of the current Computer Information Systems program but also in restructuring the Computer Science program to meet the Association of Computing Machinery (ACM) requirements; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Bidgoli was an outstanding educator who was recognized with the Franc A. Landee award for Teaching Excellence in 1991 for his exemplary dedication to teaching and his students, and in 1995 he was awarded the SVSU Faculty Association Service Award for his service on numerous committees and in executive positions; and

WHEREAS, in addition to his enthusiastic and passionate classroom presence, it was common to see Mr. Bidgoli assisting students in scheduling, writing letters of recommendation for both industry and graduate programs and advising students on their future careers, in addition, he routinely dedicated much time and energy at SVSU Open Houses, Parent Orientation programs, Summer Orientation programs, SVSU Fresh Start programs and advising transfer and international students – all instances where his friendly and outgoing personality was often the first exposure to the department that students receive, making him the face of the CSIS Department for many; and

WHEREAS, the student chapter of the ACM has been very active at SVSU since 1986 due in large part to Mr. Bidgoli who served as the ACM advisor for twenty years (1987 - 2007), helping the chapter recruit underclassmen, bring in guest speakers, take SVSU students to the ACM regional programming competitions and helping the chapter start the annual SVSU ACM high school programming contest, which brings in students from all over Michigan, some of whom decide to attend Saginaw Valley as a result, for his efforts, Mr. Bidgoli was awarded the Terry Ishihara award for Outstanding Co-curricular Involvement in 2005; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Bidgoli's career at SVSU has consisted of dedication to his profession and the institution, and as he has received many of the highest accolades that the University bestows, he will be remembered for his excellence as a teacher, mentor, colleague and friend;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT Mr. Moe Bidgoli be recognized as Professor Emeritus.

Provost Huntley stated that Mr. Moe Bidgoli joined the faculty in the department of Computer Science in 1985 and has provided outstanding service to the department of College of Science Engineering and Technology since that time. She commented that he was instrumental in the development, refinement and enhancement of the Computer Information Systems major as well as working with the computer science program to meet the requirements for the Association of Computing Machinery. She added that Mr. Bidgoli

was very student-centered and worked hard to ensure students had the best possible learning experience.

The motion was APPROVED unanimously.

7. Resolution to Grant Emeritus Status to Stephen Hocquard

RES-2284 It was moved and supported that the following resolution be adopted:

WHEREAS, Saginaw Valley State University grants emeritus status to retiring faculty/administrators who have served the University with distinction; and

WHEREAS, Stephen Hocquard has devoted 25 years of service to SVSU, having arrived at SVSU on July 1, 1992 as Director of Engineering Services, and during his tenure at SVSU his responsibilities with the University included Assistant Vice President of Campus Facilities from 2002-2011, and Assistant Vice President of Facilities Planning & Construction from September 2011 until his retirement in 2017; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Hocquard was heavily involved in the design, construction and renovations of two-thirds of the current campus, and during his tenure facility space increased from 923,000 square feet to 2,544,000 square feet; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Hocquard; served on the Board of Directors for the Michigan Chapter of APPA (MiAPPA) for several years, and was the founder and Chair of the MiAPPA Energy Engineers group from its inception in 2011 until his retirement in 2017, and advocated throughout his career for energy reduction/mitigation during major expansion or renovation projects;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT Mr. Stephen Hocquard be recognized as "Assistant Vice President of Facilities Planning & Construction Emeritus."

Mr. Muladore, Executive Vice President for Administration and Business Affairs, commented that Mr. Hocquard began his career with Saginaw Valley State University in 1992. Mr. Muladore stated that Mr. Hocquard was heavily involved in the extensive design, construction and renovations on campus over the past 25 years. He further added that SVSU's campus experienced a significant period of expansion under Mr. Hocquard's leadership and he was very dedicated to this institution.

The motion was APPROVED unanimously.

8. Resolution to Adopt General Fund Operating Budget for FY2019

RES-2285 It was moved and supported that the following resolution be adopted:

WHEREAS, The Administration and Board of Control of the University have determined the level of General Fund expenditure allocations required for personnel, services, supplies and equipment to maintain quality instructional and support services provided to students; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the attached General Fund Budget Summary which establishes the FY2019 operating budget be adopted;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the attached tuition and fee schedule of rates, effective beginning with fiscal year 2019 fall semester, also be adopted.

Mr. Muladore noted that the proposed tuition and fee schedule reflects a tuition increase of 4.98 percent as part of the 2018-19 general fund operating budget. Mr. Muladore stated that SVSU will continue to have the lowest tuition among the 15 Michigan public universities for 2018-19.

President Bachand commented that all budget decisions are made with students and families in mind, and this budget maintains our priorities of providing outstanding opportunities for our students and ensuring access to a high-quality education. He noted that SVSU has significantly expanded our scholarship and financial aid offerings to support students and families, and our plan is to continue to work hard to sustain our longstanding commitment to affordability.

The motion was APPROVED unanimously.

9. Resolution of the Board of Control of Saginaw Valley State University Approving Conveyance of Property & an Amendment to the Lease for the SVSU Business & Professional Development Center Project

RES-2286 It was moved and supported that the following resolution be adopted:

WHEREAS, the Board of Control of Saginaw Valley State University (the "University") has previously conveyed property (the "Original Site") to the State Building Authority (the "Authority") for the purpose of acquiring and constructing the Saginaw Valley State University Business and Professional Development Center (the "Facility") which was leased to the University pursuant to a lease dated as of November 1, 1997 (the "Lease") among the University, the Authority and the State of Michigan (the "State"); and

WHEREAS, the Original Site contains land described on the attached Exhibit A (the "Excess Property") which is not needed for the Facility; and

(See Appendix Four: Exhibit A)

WHEREAS, the University needs the Excess Property for the purpose of construction of the College of Business and Management Expansion project, which will be conveyed to and leased from the Authority; and

WHEREAS, the University would like the Authority to convey the Excess Property to the University; and

WHEREAS, INTEGRA Realty Resources – Detroit has stated that the transfer of the Excess Property will not reduce the economic or market value of the Facility to the State and the University and the true rental for the Facility should not be reduced; and

WHEREAS, the transfer of the Excess Property will require an amendment to the Lease (the "Lease Amendment");

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF CONTROL OF SAGINAW VALLEY STATE UNIVERSITY THAT:

- 1. The University authorizes the conveyance of the Excess Property from the Authority to the University for the consideration of One Dollar (\$1.00).
- 2. The University hereby authorizes and approves the Lease Amendment in substantially the form attached, and any one of the two of the following then seated officers of the University: President - Donald J. Bachand and Executive Vice President for Administration & Business Affairs - James G. Muladore, (each an "Authorized Officer") are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver the Lease Amendment in substantially the form for and on behalf of the University.

(Appendix Five: Agreement)

- 3. The Authorized Officers are severally or jointly authorized and directed to take or cause to be taken all other actions, including, without limitation, making requests of and approving requests from the Authority and the State and signing certificates, documents or other instruments, each on behalf of the University as they deem necessary or desirable under the circumstances to accomplish the purposes of the transactions authorized in this Resolution.
- 4. The University agrees that the Rental for the Facility will not be reduced by the transfer of the Excess Property.
- 5. This resolution shall be effective immediately upon its adoption.

Mr. Muladore noted that this authorization will allow SVSU to work with the State of Michigan's State Building Authority on the construction of a 38,500 square foot building addition for the Scott L. Carmona College of Business and Management.

The motion was APPROVED unanimously.

10. Resolution to Amend Energy Contracting Authority

RES-2287 It was moved and supported that the following resolution be adopted:

WHEREAS, SVSU currently has a natural gas supply agreement with the state of Michigan and an electricity sales agreement with Wolverine Power Marketing Cooperative; and,

WHEREAS, The University discusses periodically with suppliers options to purchase natural gas and electricity for future periods;

12. Resolution to Approve the SVSU Support Staff Association Contract

WHEREAS, Representatives of the University and the SVSU Support Staff Association, MEA/NEA reached a tentative contract agreement between the University and the Association on June 7, 2018; and,

WHEREAS, The SVSU Support Staff Association, MEA/NEA ratified the proposed agreement on June 14, 2018;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Control does hereby approve the Collective Bargaining Agreement between Saginaw Valley State University and the SVSU Support Staff Association, MEA/NEA covering the period July 1, 2018 through June 30, 2021.

The three-year agreement covers the period from July 1, 2018 through June 30, 2021. Terms call for wage increases of 2 percent in the first year, 1.05 percent in the second year and 1 percent in the third year.

Ellen Crane, Director of Human Resources, noted that the Support Staff Association union membership ratified the proposed contract on June 12, 2018. She stated that the three-year agreement covers the period from July 1, 2018 through June 30, 2021. She explained that the terms call for wage increases of 2 percent in the first year, 1.05 percent in the second year and 1 percent in the third year.

Ms. Crane indicated that the deal also provides increased flexibility in health care coverage options. She stated that as part of the contract, members will be offered a new health insurance option that features a health savings account and lower premiums, in addition to the medical plans previously offered. She further added that the agreement includes modest

increases in the capped contributions the university makes to employees' health care coverage under existing plans.

President Bachand commented that he appreciates the fine work our dedicated support staff employees provide daily. He stated that making a good first impression is so important, and these are the people who keep our campus looking its best, who greet students and families and help them when they have questions, and who do important work behind the scenes to ensure campus operations run smoothly.

The motion was APPROVED unanimously.

Appendix One: Cole

Adrianne Cole

Director of STEM • May Staff Member of the Month

The seeds that sprouted into Adrianne Cole's STEM career were planted early and nurtured both by forces of nature and inspirational figures alike.

Cole, a two-time SVSU graduate and director of STEM at the university today, began developing a love for the sciences as far back as she can remember. Growing up the granddaughter of a tree nursery owner in Merrill, she spent her earliest years on the family property among nature.

"I was always outdoors — hunting, fishing, trapping, sledding, skating, and building forts in the woods — and that's where I knew I wanted to do something relating to nature and science," she said. "I just didn't know what."

Then she received sage guidance from her sixth-grade teacher, Mrs. Rahl, at Merrill Middle School.

"She opened my eyes to show me I could do something like this, and made me love the subject even more," Cole said. "She really helped me ignite that passion for STEM."

That sentiment carried her through K-12 and later SVSU, where she earned a bachelor's degree in biology in 2000. After a short stint professionally as a chemist, Cole decided her place wasn't the laboratory. She wanted to help inspire others excited by STEM, much the same way her middle school teacher once inspired her.

She returned to SVSU to earn a teaching certification in 2002

and then a master's degree in teaching in 2006. She served as an adjunct faculty member at SVSU and worked for 12 years as a science teacher at Heritage High School in Saginaw Township. She also was a member of the first group of high school teachers selected to participate in SVSU's Dow Science and Sustainability Education Center Summer Research Experience in 2014.

The following year, she joined SVSU's staff as the STEM program manager, helping to develop programs aimed at inspiring and training future STEM-based employees for a region with a growing need for such a work force. Now, as director of STEM, Cole is charged with overseeing more than a dozen programs largely involving working closely with on-campus faculty, staff and students as well as community partners and K-12 educators.

"I get to do a little bit of everything now," she said. "There are days when I can go into classrooms and interact with students, and there are days when I am bringing groups to campus and watching their eyes light up when we introduce them to what STEM can do for them."

Among those whose eyes lit up while attending SVSU's STEM outreach programs: Cole's presumably SVSU-bound daughters, 11-year-old Christy and 9-year-old Cate. Their mother recognizes their fledgling love for science, nurtured both by forces of nature and inspirational figures alike.



John Flores

Assistant Director, Academic Advisement Center • July Staff Member of the Month

When John Flores gazes out of his first floor Wickes Hall office window, he can see the way his world has changed at SVSU- and he can see the way it's stayed very much the same.

His view of the west end of the courtyard often reveals the enthusiasm and energy of the university's student life as well as some of its most scenic outdoors features. On a sunny day in 2018, the view arguably is SVSU at its most picturesque. But when Flores first arrived at SVSU as an undergraduate in the early 1980s — long before he inhabited his office — that corner of campus was a parking lot for a university in its teens with a student population about half the size of today's enrollment.

"It was a lot different back then," said Flores, now an assistant director of the Academic Advisement Center, "but I've always believed in this place. That has never changed. That's why I've never left."

Flores earned his bachelor's degree in accounting in 1990. He was in the midst of studying for his CPA exam when he was offered a grant-funded, part-time position working with Delta College students transferring to SVSU.

"For the first years of my existence as an employee here, we weren't sure how long the position was going to last because we weren't sure if we were going to get the grant funding, year-by-year," he said.

In the meantime, Flores became more involved on campus by joining the Hispanic Student Association as a co-adviser. Eventually, he enjoyed more secure employment when he accepted a full-time permanent staff position in the Minority Student Services office. He joined the Academic Advisement Center in 2002.

In all those roles, Flores helped guide the lives of students on a 1-on-1 basis. He still relishes the opportunity for that type of interaction.

His family shares in that school pride. His son, Anthony, is an alumnus. His other children, Lena and Vincent, are students now.

SVSU's growth since Flores' undergraduate days strengthened his allegiance to the university and the students who define it.

"It's really turned into a lively campus over the years," said Flores, who also earned a master's degree in educational leadership in 1997.

"The different cultures, the different interests and different personalities — it's easy to feel energized by all of that. They make this job easy and enjoyable."

While the view through Flores' office window becomes less active during the summer months, Flores said his anticipation of the next generation of students arriving in the fall keeps him excited about the work ahead — and the continued evolution of the university.

LEASE AMENDMENT

THIS LEASE AMENDMENT is made and entered into as of the date set forth on the cover hereof among the STATE BUILDING AUTHORITY (the "Authority"), a public corporation organized and existing under the authority of Act 183, Public Acts of Michigan, 1964, as amended, the STATE OF MICHIGAN (the "State"), and the BOARD OF CONTROL OF SAGINAW VALLEY STATE UNIVERSITY, a Michigan constitutional body corporate, (the "Educational Institution").

PREMISES:

WHEREAS, the Authority, the Educational Institution, and the State (the "Parties") have entered into a lease dated as of November 1, 1997 (the "Lease") for the Saginaw Valley State University Business and Professional Development Center (the "Facility") as defined in the Lease on the site as described in Exhibit B of the Lease (the "Site");

WHEREAS, the State intends to create a new rental development (the "Development");

WHEREAS, a portion of the Site as described in Exhibit A of this Lease Amendment (the "Excess Property") is needed for the creation of the Development, and is not needed for the Facility as defined in the Lease;

WHEREAS, INTEGRA Realty Resources - Detroit has stated that the release of the Excess Property will not reduce the economic market value of the Facility to the State such that the true rental for the Facility should be reduced; and

WHEREAS, the Parties desire to release the Excess Property from the Lease in order to permit its use for the creation of the Development.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises and undertakings of this Lease Amendment, the Parties agree as follows:

- 1. All terms not defined herein shall have the meanings as set forth on the Lease.
- 2. Exhibit B to the Lease is amended by deleting from the legal description of the Site the Excess Property described on Exhibit A of this Lease Amendment.
